

Measurement:

Estimate volume and capacity.

Convert between different units of measure.

Geometry

Know angles are measured in degrees.

Estimate and compare acute, obtuse and reflex angles.

Draw and measure given angles.



History

British Kings and Queens

A study of an aspect or theme in British history that extends pupils' chronological knowledge beyond 1066. The changing power of monarchs using case studies such as John, Anne and Victoria.

Describe the main changes in a period of history (using terms such as: social, religious, political, technological and cultural). Identify periods of rapid change in history and contrast with times of relatively little change.

To develop ideas in sketch books, taking inspiration from a range of different artists. To improve their mastery of art and design techniques, including drawing and painting with a range of materials. To evaluate and analyse creative works using the language of art, craft and design. Have an understanding of great artists, architects and designers in history.

This half term, the content in the curriculum map will be delivered through remote learning on the Google Classroom, live sessions and in school face-to-face lessons for critical worker children.

In addition to recovery of lost learning in class and on the google classroom, our school will be recovering some lost learning through the National Tutoring Programme (NTP).
